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

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AL AHLI HOSPITAL'S COMMUNITY HEALTHCARE PROGRAMME

In July 2023, I visited an area of Gaza called Al Mawasi. I had not heard of this area before, but now the whole world knows the name. It became the designated 'safe zone' in Gaza, 3.3 sq. miles of largely agricultural and sandy land that runs along the Mediterranean Sea.

here, I met a group of female 'Community Mobilisers' - volunteers trained by Al Ahli Hospital to go into homes and talk with mothers, about hygiene, nutrition and their rights, and help identify families where further intervention may be necessary, for example via Al Ahli's 'Community Healthcare Programme', which Embrace has been supporting since 2014.

This programme works with local community centres, helping those in more isolated areas get access to hospital care by transporting them to hospital for a day. There they can get the consultations, health awareness sessions and diagnostic tests they need - such as for cancer and also osteopenia, which is common amongst women in Gaza due to inadequate levels of vitamin D. Left untreated, it often develops into osteoporosis.

The ripple effect in families and communities of this kind of preventative intervention is huge, both socially and economically. Without this opportunity, many would not have sought out medical attention until their condition had deteriorated to a point where the prognosis is poorer, and treatment harder and more expensive.

Building capacity within the community is also an integral part of the mission. The need in Gaza is astronomical (even before the latest round of conflict), and so each year Al Ahli's programme moves on to serve different communities. This is less than ideal – it could be years before the programme returns – but there is always something left

behind. As Suhaila Tarazi, director of Al Ahli, put it: 'We leave a fingerprint' – such as Al Mawasi's Community Mobilisers.

I remember these women as vibrant and passionate about improving the situation for their community. Now they are often in my thoughts. I hope they are safe and that their knowledge means that they have been able to help some of the thousands of displaced people who have descended on that little sandy strip.

As medical teams across Gaza continue to work against the odds to treat the sick and injured, I'm sure that Al Ahli hospital's 'fingerprints' from the last 10 years of community outreach and development can be seen clearly.

NEW PAEDIATRIC DEPARTMENT OPENS AT HARPUR HOSPITAL

Embrace has been partnering with the Christian-run Harpur Memorial Hospital in Menouf, Egypt for over 40 years. So, when they told us they needed a new purpose-built unit for their Paediatric Department, we worked with them to get the funds needed for their project.

OII: The shell of the building was already constructed but funds were needed for the internal building works, furnishings and equipment.


02: The new department includes four paediatric clinic rooms, a doctor/on-call room, a nursing station, and a large outpatient room where patients can be treated and monitored.

03 & 04: Embrace funding also paid for medical equipment, including four hospital beds and monitoring apparatus for the outpatient room, as well as the office furniture and IT equipment for staff. **05:** The new building not only significantly increases the number of patients that can be seen, but it also means they can get all their treatment in the same place with better coordination of care.

Ob: The new paediatric department was opened last autumn, helping the hospital continue its mission of "Providing excellent medical care to all for the glory of God". Promoting medical best practice and a holistic approach to treatment is key to the hospital's ethos and the centralised department can now also serve as a teaching facility, helping to train up the next generation of paediatricians for many years to come.

SYRIA EARTHQUAKE: ONE YEAR ON

It has been over year since the earthquake of 6 February 2023 struck Turkey and Syria. Through our partner MERATH, we continue to work with churches in Northern Syria as they provide vital support to families still struggling to rebuild their lives after the devastation and amid an unrelenting economic crisis.

One of the churches sent us this update:

yria already was, and is still, suffering from economic crises and deteriorating living conditions. When the earthquake happened, the feeling of fear, confusion, and insecurity was overwhelming. But quickly, the sense of responsibility took over, as we started to respond to the material and psychological consequences of this tragedy.





PROVIDING SHELTER, FOOD AND MEDICINE

Right from the start, the church opened its doors to the affected and displaced. For one month, the people who had taken refuge in the church were provided with food, water, heating, blankets, supplies for infants, medicine, and psychological support, especially for children and youth.

REPAIRING HOMES

Later, the committee took recovery steps through assistance to restore homes of affected people, and distribute financial grants and monthly vouchers to ease the burden.

But the circumstances in Syria have kept deteriorating. Unemployment remains very high and the country is experiencing surreal inflation. Most of the vital goods – such as food and medicine – have become completely unaffordable to most people. We continue to distribute food, milk, diapers and hygiene supplies; and help with health services and winter items.

Our church works very hard to meet the needs of families during these exceptionally hard times. Our spiritual and humanitarian message calls us to persevere and overcome difficulties with God's grace and the help of partners like you.

We believe the role and responsibility of the church is to follow in Jesus' footsteps. Jesus met both the spiritual and the physical needs of the people, and so we are to do the same.

170TH ANNIVERSARY: EMBRACE MEMORIES

Graham's Story

Graham Hobbs was just three years old when he first came across Embrace. Now he's helping us to mark our 170th anniversary by sharing his story:

My memories of Embrace begin in the 1950s. From the age of three I had to endure - and not disturb - some tedious church services. I didn't know what I was looking at, but part of my survival technique was to look at the pictures on the Bethlehem Carol Sheet (right).

Roll forward to 1967. My parents returned from a trip to Israel and Jordan, leaving just days before the 6 Day War began. They were impressed by the achievements that Israel had made in its 20-year life, but they also felt for the Palestinian refugees they had met in the West Bank. I began to take a mild interest.

In 2005 my daughter Jen began working for Embrace (then BibleLands). Naturally, I knew much more about the organisation than I had 50 years earlier, but I was about to learn a deep lesson. Our Jen took a party of young volunteers to work in an orphanage in Bethlehem. They'd hardly arrived when Hezbollah started firing rockets and Israel retaliated. Till then these things would have just been news. This time, my own daughter was in

the area. I realised that wars were about real people.

The group decided to stay put and get on with the job.* People seeking refuge from the




fighting slept on the floor with them, they were Palestinian Christians and citizens of Israel. I realised what a difficult situation they could find themselves in. Being Palestinian, Christian and Israeli in a land where identity has so much meaning is not simple. I can't imagine what some of these people are going through now, at a time when differences are magnified.

My daughter left Embrace to have daughters of her own, but I still have mementoes that she brought back from the Holy Land. A final legacy is the difference that engaging with BibleLands/Embrace has made to me. The three-year-old looking at pictures in a carol sheet has grown into a 70-year-old whose involvement with Embrace has taught him to appreciate the humanity behind those pictures.

A new **special education centre** in the West Bank

ainstream schools in Palestine are open to all, but most of them are not equipped to support students with disabilities, particularly those with learning difficulties. Children like Ashar are left struggling and isolated, and often leave school with very little education.

Embrace partner BASR (The Bethlehem Arab Society for Rehabilitation) is changing this by working with the local Palestinian authorities to provide specialist education facilities, such as the centre at Tuqqu.

The Tuqqu Center for Special Education opened last year in the village of Tuqqu, near Bethlehem, and supports children with a wide range of intellectual disabilities. It is the result of close collaboration between BASR and the Tuqqu municipality, which provided a building for the centre and has taken on part of the continued running costs.

Following the 7th October attacks, the centre had to close for three months because of the movement restrictions and security situation in the West Bank. It has recently reopened, and we pray that it can



stay open so that it can continue to provide the vital specialist support needed by Ashar and his classmates.

Since moving to the centre, Ashar has received speech therapy and motor skills sessions to rebuild his confidence and communication. Now his speech is improving and he has started to play with his classmates. His progress is such that staff at the centre are hopeful that he will be able to integrate back into the local mainstream school this year. They will be working closely with the teachers of the school to ensure his transition goes smoothly and that he has the support he needs.

The vision of BASR is for an equal society but also an inclusive one where dignity and opportunity is available to all. It's a vision shared by Embrace and we are proud to walk alongside them, for all are one in Jesus Christ.

Psychological First Aid in the West Bank

Incidents of political violence are sadly common in the West Bank and have increased significantly since 7th October. The daily reality of such violence has a particularly negative effect on the psychological wellbeing of young people.

Since 2022, Embrace has been supporting our partner, East Jerusalem YMCA, as they provide psychological first aid, group counselling and recreational activities for young people, children and their carers in Salfit and South Nablus who have been affected by violence.

These interventions help improve wellbeing and resilience, even in the face of ongoing insecurity. In 2023, the project responded to 317 incidents of political violence and provided Psychological First Aid to more than 2,000 individuals.

This year, the YMCA has expanded their programme to Jenin, which has recently been experiencing violence and unrest on a daily basis. We pray the violence will end, but until it does, creating safe spaces for children and young people to process their traumatic experiences and heal, helps create hope for a better future.



YOU'VE HEARD OF SHOP IN A BOX, NOW GET READY FOR SHOP IN A SHED!

Tucked away in Hertfordshire's countryside is a colourful bazaar of Middle Eastern merchandise. Margaret and Alan Gilliam have been volunteering for Embrace since participating in the October 2016 Olive Harvest Trip.



hey love to raise awareness in their local area of Embrace's work and the reality of life in the Middle East. The highlight of each year is the transformation of their garden shed into a Middle Eastern shopping experience.

Shop in a Shed began during lockdown in December 2020, when Margaret and Alan realised the festive season would lack the usual church events

and craft fairs. Since outdoor socialising in private gardens was permitted, Shop in a Shed was born. Inspired by their passion for the Middle East, and hoping to raise profits in support of Embrace's healthcare, education and community development projects, Margaret and Alan began stocking authentic Middle East gifts and cards, including fairly-traded Palestinian products from Zaytoun and Bethlehem Baubles, both of whom also supply our Embrace shop.

With the launch of our Embrace Shop in a Box scheme in 2021, Margaret and Alan added Embrace-branded items to their stock, and Shop in a Shed has increased in popularity yearly, with many regular customers and a bespoke logo.

In the Christmas 2023 season they welcomed over 100 customers, sold out of Shop in a Box products, and raised over £1,000 for Embrace. With Gaza in many hearts and minds this year, Palestinian products were particularly popular – in total, Shop in a Shed customers purchased 15 litres of olive oil and 6 kilos of dates! The shop allows Margaret and Alan to share their passion with their community and has led to various spin-off events: a soup lunch, church Christmas Fair stall and Middle Eastern Cookery classes.

Margaret and Alan's story is just one example of many creative ways that you, our valued supporters, embrace opportunities to engage your communities in supporting Embrace's mission. In 2023, we distributed 30 Shop in a Box kits to hosts across the country, raising an incredible £10,000.
